

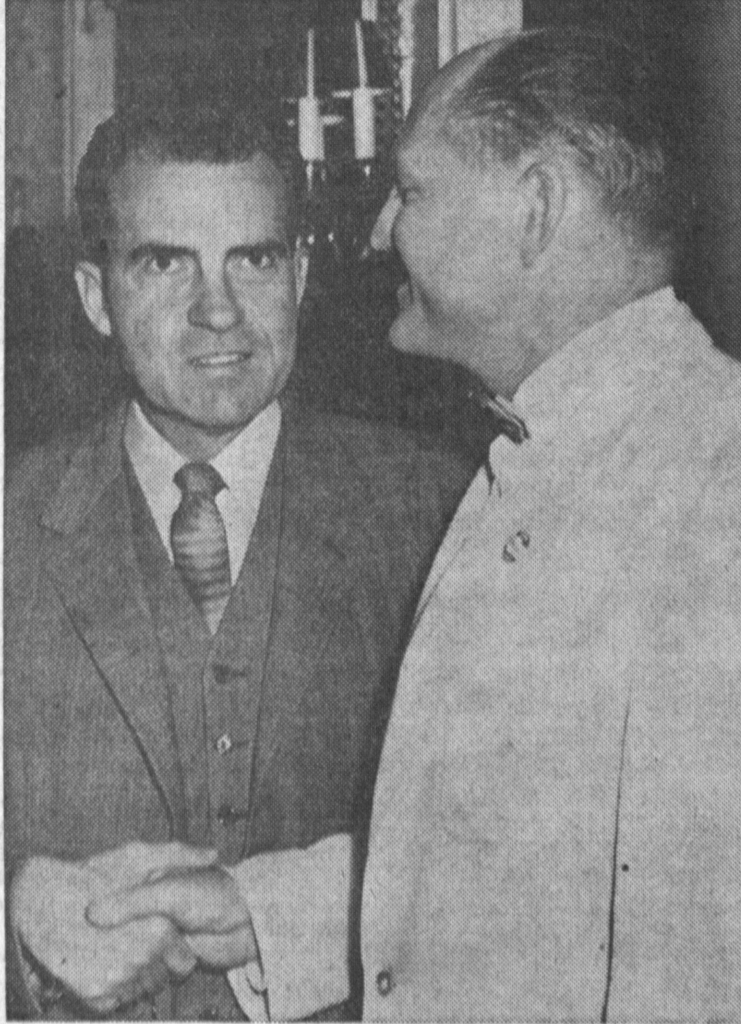

Imported Cars To Participate In Economy Run

Cars imported from Europe and Asia will get their first chance to demonstrate their fuel economy in a nationally sanctioned American competition on Sunday, Oct. 19.

The occasion will be the 1958 Mobil Mileage Rally, sponsored by General Petroleum Corporation, and sanctioned and conducted by the United States Auto Club. The rally will be held here in Los Angeles, where more imported cars are sold than anywhere else in the nation.

It will be mostly an industry affair, with a majority of the entrants sponsored by imported car dealers, dealer associations, and distributors.

Baseball Board Created

A newly formed Youth Baseball Commission will hold a meeting Wednesday to discuss coordination of Little League games with the city's recreation program.

R. P. (Pat) Hogue was elected temporary chairman of the group which was formed at a special meeting of the Recreation Commission this week.

Approximately 18 representatives of Little Leagues attended the organizational meeting.

One of the first projects of the new group will be to appoint a baseball " czar" to take charge of scheduling of playing facilities.

The commission was advocated by Harry B. Van Bellehem, director of the Recreation Department, as means of central coordination for the various leagues. If the system works out, all matters affecting scheduling of playing facilities can then be worked out between the department and the commission.

Improvement for Licensing of Rest Homes Urged

New legislation should be enacted to simplify licensing and inspecting of rest homes, boarding homes and sanitariums for the aged, to place control over these institutions in one central agency, rather than several as is now the case.

Such is the conclusion of William A. Barr, County Superintendent of Charities, in a report to Supervisor Kenneth Hahn concerning the overall problem of rest homes for the aged.

At the present time, these institutions are licensed by three departments—the State Department of Public Health, the State Department of Social Welfare, and the State Department of Mental Hygiene, depending upon the type of patient cared for.

In addition, the County's Public Welfare Commission and its Bureau of Inspections are directly concerned with the care given the patients.

Charges Fly on City Lease

Charges that a restaurateur is trying to "chisel" on his rent were hurled Tuesday, when the City Council unanimously decided to hold Sidney Hodemaker, president of Hody's restaurant chain to his original contract with the city.

"First we gave him an extension, now he wants to chisel on his rent," snapped Mayor Albert Isen.

Herbert Albright, Hodemaker's representative, asked the city for relief on rental for the corner of Pacific Coast Highway and Crenshaw Blvd. The rent this month went up to \$600 per month.

Albright asked for a reduction rent until April 1, because the restaurant is not even built.

"There's been one breach of contract after another," declared Councilman George Bradford, referring to alteration of plans, which will make the eatery smaller than had been announced earlier.

The Council finally decided that the city should keep the restaurateur to his lease, and have him come in with alternative suggestions which the city may, or may not, agree to.

Lomita Street Improvements

Supervisor Burton W. Chace announced today that the Los Angeles County Road Department has been authorized to construct 242nd st. from Narbonne ave. to Eshelman ave.

Upon completion, this project will provide the traveling public a smoother riding surface which should expedite the flow of traffic through the area.

Turn Down License
Torrance Veterans of Foreign Wars will not be granted a fireworks stand permit, the City Council decided. It took the action after License Inspector Gale Whitacre reported that the post was only one of 10 organizations that had not made a financial report on this year's Fourth of July sales.
