For every student shifted into the public schools the cost would be \$346 per student per year. A 25% shift in enrollment would boost public school costs by \$32,500,000

DON'T PAY THE PRICE OF TAX DISCRIMINATION!

Parents of nonprofit school students pay all public school taxes like everyone else. They also pay the full costs of land, buildings, bond interest and tuition for the nonprofit schools their children attend.

These schools get no public funds. They seek none. They get no subsidy. They ask for none.

In exchange for the community service they render, nonprofit schools are tax exempt-in California and in all the 48 states. Statewide, the exemption totals less than \$1,800,000 a year.

Compare that figure with 118-MILLION. DOLLAR TAX SAVING FOR TAX-PAYERS and the economic absurdity of Proposition No. 16 becomes apparent.
