## Three New Schools Approved

With more building funds available as the result of the passage of the recent school bond issue, the Torrance School Board Tuesday night went ahead with plans for three new elementary schools and additions to five others.

Preliminary plans and specifications for the Adams Elementary School, 238th and Arlington Ave., were approved by the board, with Architect George Schreiber authorized to complete working drawings. The school, which will cost an estimated \$470,000, will include two kindergarten rooms, eight classrooms, administration building, multipurpose building, and shop and homemaking units.

The board also commissioned Architect Roy Donley to draw plans for Madison School, 376th and Amie Ave.; and Towers School, Towers and Ronald Ave. Both schools will contain 12 classrooms, administration building, multipurpose building, and music room. Towers will have two kindergarten rooms, while Madison will have one.

Donley also was named to draw plans for four classroom additions at Anza, Lincoln, Sepulveda, Newton, and Arlington Elementary Schools. It was noted that the additions at Lincoln School are underway even before the school, now under construction, is completed. Enrollment estimates indicate that the addition at Lincoln will be needed soon after the school opens.

## Match Flinger Likened to Hit and Run Driver

The motorist who throws a burning cigarette, cigar, or match out of his car was likened to a hit-and-run driver by California Highway Patrol Commissioner B. R. Caldwell.

"Just as a hit-and-run driver runs away from the scene of his crime, so does the person who starts a disastrous fire with his illegally disposed of cigarette, cigar, or match," Caldwell said.

"The fact that the latter may not know he has started a fire is no excuse. He violated the California Vehicle Code when he threw the lighted substance from his car."

Caldwell noted that weather conditions are such that the fire hazards continue to be acute. Highway Patrol officers, who issued 90 citations during August for throwing burning cigarettes, cigars, or matches from cars, will remain especially alert to this violation, he said.

## Change Noted in Disability Benefits

With the 200,000 checks mailed out this month to disabled workers is a notice that supplementary benefits may be paid to certain members of his family. These supplementary payments were made possible by the 1958 amendments to the social security law.

More than 1500 totally and permanently disabled persons are receiving checks in the Long Beach area, some of whom may have dependents eligible to receive auxiliary payments.

The dependents of disabled persons receiving social security checks should contact their social security office as soon as possible.

## School Children Aided by Street

Dedication of a strip of school property for street purposes, to allow access to Edison School, was approved by the Torrance Board of Education Tuesday night after a public hearing.

No protests were received on the proposal, to dedicate a 30-foot strip of property at the southwest corner of North High School to the city for extension of 186th St. as far as Felber Ave.

This would allow children who live directly south of Edison School to walk by a shorter route than the roundabout way they now must travel via Prairie Ave.

## This Thief Is No Vegetarian

A quantity of steaks and ground beef were stolen from the Broiler Exceptionale, 4125 Pacific Coast Hwy. over the weekend.

Police said that the meat, valued at \$80, and coins were stolen by the burglars. Joseph Wagner, of 1729 Cabrillo Ave., reported theft of his wallet, containing \$310 from his hotel room, while taking a bath, officers said.
