Law to Control Poisonous Castor Beans Sought by Mothers in Petition Drive

A petition drive to request the City Council to pass a law which would control and reguthe extremely dangerous castor plant beans, was planned this week by a group of mothers. Mrs. Virginia Caley, of 22207 Linda Dr., said she and neighbors will ask the city to place some restrictions on the growth of these plants, which recently claimed the life of a Fontana toddler, and almost proved fatal to a Torrance youngster.

"If we can't get an ordinance to prohibit them, perhaps the City Council can control-or regulate these plants," said Mrs. Caley.

Danger Cited The danger of the beans, if chewed was pointed out in Thursday's article in the Torrance Press, in which Mrs. Vera M. Kiesler, of 3633 W. 180th Pl. urged that parents not let their children come in contact vith the beans.

Mrs. Caley said that she and other mothers in her neighborhood, successfully petitioned the the City Council for better safeguards for private swimming pools, and that she hopes petitions will also bring some type of legislation to control castor bean plants.

Health officials have warned that the beans are nearly always fatal if chewed, and that there is no known antidote.

The poison from the bean affects the circulatory system, Dr B. A. Kogan, Torrance health officer said.

Ornamental The plants have beautiful clusters of leaves which make them quite popular as ornamental plants. They also grow as weeds in vacant lots.

Mrs. Kiesler said that while the plants might not be too objectionable in a fenced yard, they should certainly be controlled so that they are not easily accessible to children.

Officials in City Attorney Stanley Remelmeyer's office said that if the City Council requests it, he will study what laws can be enacted to regulate these


