

In South High **Class Buildings** A change in the type of footing for two classroom buildings at

South High School was approved by the Torrance Board of Education Tuesday night, due to an apparent error on the part of a soil-testing laboratory.

The two classroom buildings, scheduled to open in September, were designed with five-foot

spread footings, based on the laboratory report that the ground would hold up o 1850 pounds

pressure per square foot. When work on the classrooms began, it was found that the ground would hold less than 1000 pounds pressure per square inch. This type of ground will require 30-foot caissons to support the building. The soil content on

various parts of the 40-acre site varies considerably. Although redesign of the foot-

ings for the buildings has caused delay in starting work on them, school officials hope that they will be ready for use next Sep-
