Some 60 new teachers will be needed to handle the increased number of children in Torrance schools next year, according to a report received by the Board of Education

Preliminary estimates indicate that more than 25,000 children will enroll. To handle this load, an additional 44 elementary and 16 high school teachers will be needed, bringing the total number of teachers in the district to nearly

The personnel department probably will have to hire about 190 more teachers, including the 60 new ones and replacements for those who leave at the end of the year. This figure is based on past experience of Torrance and
