

Bubbles' boyfriend was towed back to Marineland aboard a 24 foot rubber raft especially designed for the job by the Firestone Tire and Rubber Co. The collapsible raft was slipped underneath the body of the huge sea beast as it lay in the water after being captured. The raft was quickly inflated and the whale was dry-docked. When brought to Marineland's pier, it was loisted into a waiting truck and carried 500

Legion to Give Student Awards


Awards medals will be presented to outstanding students at graduation ceremonies in June by Bert S. Crossland Post 170, American Legion.
