The rash generally first ap pears on the face and forearms. It may eventually cover the entire body or remain scattered and mild. The blisters gradually dry, and a scab or crust forms over them. About 3 weeks after the appearance of symptoms the scabs drop off, leaving pitted. scars in their place.
