It all started when a youth was observed mowed down by a bullet in the parking lot of Shoppers Market, 110 East Caron St. Witnesses excitedly told depu-


ties that they observed two youths in a cruising car fire a shot. As soon as the gun was fired, the victim grabbed his head and collapsed on the parking lot.
