

Planners Call Bluff

If Torrance residents want a Spanish name for their street to give it more class, the Planning Commission certainly has no objection.

This was indicated Wednesday when they received a petition from 13 residents who reside on a segment of Bluff St., which was recently extended from Wilmington Ave. and 242nd St. on the east to Vista Montana on the west.

The owners of the newly developed tract asked that the name of their street be changed to a Spanish-sounding name such as Calle de Primero or Calle de Rosa.

The signers, headed by Myles Hamilton, claim that their street actually has no connection with the old Bluff St., which has been there for more than a generation, and besides, all the other streets in the area have Spanish names.

Commission President Bert Lynn, aware that Bluff St. had been there a long time, but believing that residents should have a choice about their street name, agreed.

He promptly suggested calling the road "Avenida de Bluff.'

Other helpful commissioners went farther. They recommended Calle de Bluff, Paseo de Bluff, Camino de Bluff, Vista de Bluff, Via de Bluff, or any other Spanish word for street, providing it contains the word Bluff.

This accomplished, they passed the whole matter along to the City Council for final action in about a week.
