Chandler's Adds Two Mix Plants

L. H. Chandler, owner and president of Chandler's Palos Verdes Sand and Gravel Co., started in business at the present location, 26311 Narbonne ave., Lomita, in 1937. Starting production on a small scale without any trucks for deliveries, Chandler has expanded the plant three or four times. Two Ready Mixed Concrete plants have been added, one at the Lomita address and a new plant at 160 Illinois st., El Segundo.

The company has progressed from a plant without any trucks to its present day operation with over one hundred pieces of moving equipment. Products are washed concrete sand, washed plaster sand, compactable fill sand, three quarter inch and onehalf inch gravel, Ready Mixed Concrete and all building material supplies. Deliveries are made to the entire Southwest and Harbor areas.

Chandler is also the owner of two buliding material yards, Compton Plaster Building Material Company in Compton and Compton Plaster Building Ma-

Union Aids Many with Own Funds

Out of five dollars dues payment, two dollars and fifty cents is paid to affiliated organizations.
