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Job Study Asked by Educators

Job descriptions and salaries of Torrance Unified School District employes came under the eye of the Board of Eductaion Tuesday night, as it made some changes in line with recommendations of the State Cooperative Personnel Services.

Because of the growth of the district, the board requested the survey, covering all non-teaching employes and comparing their duties and salaries with those in more than 650 private firms and government agencies in Los Angeles County. The survey covered more than a million workers.

In some cases, duties for jobs were altered or salaries raised to bring them into line with comparable jobs elsewhere. The salary revisions will cost an additional \$1400 each month.

The last survey of district employes was made in 1955. The mushrooming growth of the district, however, has greatly increased the number of employes and variey of services. The district now has 340 clerks, custodians, groundsmen, maintenance personnel, and other necessary jobs. School cafeterias employ 107 persons.



Torrance Firm **Gets Contract** for Launchers

Horkey-Moore Associates has ben awarded a contract for an additional quantity of force ejection launchers designed to launch the Air Force's atomictipped Genie MB-1 missile from supersonic Convair F-106 Delta Dart jet interceptor.

According to E. J. Horkey, president of Horkey-Moore Associates, the contract is the firm's third from Convair Division of General Dynamics Corp. Made of light-weight titanium, the launchers develop a force of nearly 20,000 pounds with which to hurtle the Genie clear of the ·F-106's missile bay.

The force ejection unit is used to replace the conventional rail or trapeze type launcher systems and reduces the weight of the launcher system. It provides sufficient ejection velocity to overcome the turbulance effects in the missile bay at supersonic moeeds, the firm states.
