Letter Writing **Sought** Against **Vet Tax Change**

A letter writing campaign to rotest any removal of the veterans tax exemption, was urged this week by Frank A. Schuk, publicity chairman of Bert S. Crossland Post American Legion. He charged that top State officials "are not the least bit interested," in the effects of the changes on veterans.

He said that conferences between Jack Flynn, Department Commander of the American Legion and Gov. Edmund G. Brown and Bert Levit, director of finance, have proved "unfruitful." Schuk said that veterans should write to their assemblymen and State senators to protest any changes.


