Alice Outwits Elmer in Hectic Rat Race

That was the conclusion that members of John A. Planting's class at Newton School arrived at recently, as they repeated Pavlov's famed experiment. The test was designed to check the conditioned responses of white rats, named "Alice" and "Elmer." The idea was to see how long it would take the rats to learn the right way through a maze

In a series of 10 tests, Alice and Elmer ran through their paces for class members and showed steady improvement. Alice made the girls happy by proving to be the smarter of the two. On her first try, she

took three minutes to find her way out of the maze, but the 10th time, she needed only 16 seconds.

Elmer, the male, took five and a half minutes in his first attempt, but improved to 20 seconds on the 10th try.

All of the scientific study of the class was confounded when one of the rats managed to work its way through the maze backward in only 10 seconds. Students didnt knowshow to record this effort.
