Because of construction delays, ome temporary classrooms may have to be set up at South High School next fall, the Torrance Board of Education was told Tuesday night.

Work on classroom additions to the school was delayed somewhat by difficulties in pouring foundations, but is proceeding at full steam ahead now, officials said. However, the buildings may ot be ready by September.

The present enrollment at South High will increase from the present 1330 to more than 1830 this fall. Putting temporary partitions in the old physical education building and on the new gymnasium mezzanine would provide enough classrooms until the new ones could be completed.

illness and accidents occurs more frequently among single persons than married ones. Furthermore, he said, the death rate is higher in wid-

owed persons and is highest among divorced, with men more subject to fatalities than

He explained that if 100 married people died from tuberculosis of the lungs, the same illness would claim the lives of 430 single, 463 widowed and 564 divorced men. This com-

"The tremendous influence on all causes of illness is indicated in diseases which long have been known to have emotional factors influencing their outcomes," Dr. Frantl said. He said the death rate

among non-married people is considerably higher in lung cancer than married people. The psychiatrist maintained that more divorced persons die
