assured of delivery if they call in their request by 4 p. m. This is in line with the policy of delivering this newspaper to all homes in the circulation area regardless of whether the carrier boy is paid for his delivery.

However, it is pointed out that the carrier boy's income depends to a great extent on the collections he makes on his route. The nominal charge of 25 cents per month is made if the Torrance Press is delivered on Thursday only. Boys will collect 45 cents if delivery is made both on Thursdays and Sundays. All persons who reside in Torrance will be guaranteed twice-

a-week delivery if they pay 45 cents to the carrier. These boys are independent young businessmen who are building character as well as earning money by working their
