New Classroom Construction Begins at Montgomery H. S.

Construction on two classroom additions and a science building for students of Bishop Montgomery High School, 5430

Torrance Blvd., has begun, according to Bruce W. McNeil, president of the McNeil Construction Company, general contractor.

Continuing the simple, functional lines of the original structures, built by McNeil in 1957, the three units are being built of wood frame and stucco. Completion date for the \$400,000 project has been set for mid-August in order to have it ready for use at the off-set of the fall semester.

Each of the new structures will have full-length and full-width corridors, intersecting at the center point, which will permit access to the buildings from all four directions. Breezeways will connect the entrances to each unit.

Built for the "co-instructional" school in which both boys and girls receive instruction, but not in mixed classes, the three single-level buildings will have large window areas permitting maximum use of natural light.

The boys' and girls' classroom additions, extensions of existing facilities, will each measure 6350 square feet. Physics, chemistry and biology laboratories, comprising the completely new and separate, 16,900 square-foot science hall, will be equipped with the most modern instruments and furnishings.

Construction of the 20 new rooms, illuminated by surface-mounted, fluorescent fixtures, will permit the high school to accommodate twice its present 600-student capacity.

Full landscaping, to harmonize with present surroundings, is planned for the units. In addition to classrooms, the two-

Council Approves Russell Contract

A contract for the employment of John V. Russell, who stepped down as public works director April 1, to be hired as a building inspector was approved by the City Council Tuesday.

The city fathers ordered that Russell's \$651 per month pay not be continued beyond Sept. 1. Only Councilman J. A. Beasley opposed the pact.

Building Superintendent Lee Schless said that he wants to hire Russell, a retired county building official, until he can fill the post by civil service examination. Schless said that this position is required because of many major building projects that will soon start.

Victor Students to Attend Meadow Park, Torrance High

Students from the Victor Tract, which will become a part of the Torrance Unified School District this summer, will attend classes at Torrance High and Meadow Park Elementary School in September, according to school officials.

The Victor area, which will have about 270 school-age children this fall, will soon become an official part of the Torrance School District, although the area already was annexed to the city of Torrance about two years ago. Victor area children now attend classes in Redondo Beach.

With opening of the Columbia School last month, Meadow Park lost a number of students who formerly attended classes in bungalows there. There will be room for Victor area children at Meadow Park this fall. Elementary children from the Victor area can attend summer school classes at Flavian Elementary School, however.

High school youngsters from the Victor area will attend both regular and summer school sessions at Torrance High School, which will have room for them. Plans for a new Victor Elementary School, at the southwest corner of Victor and Spencer, are being rushed by the school board, which recently hired an architect. West High School, the city's

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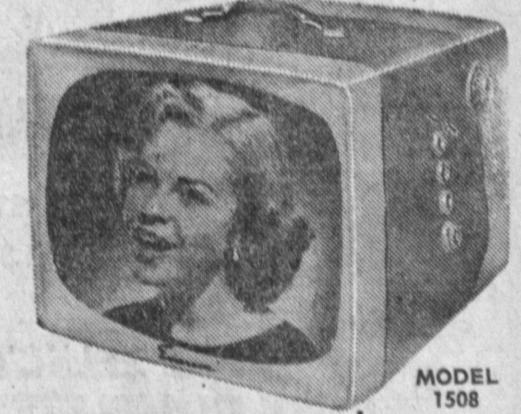
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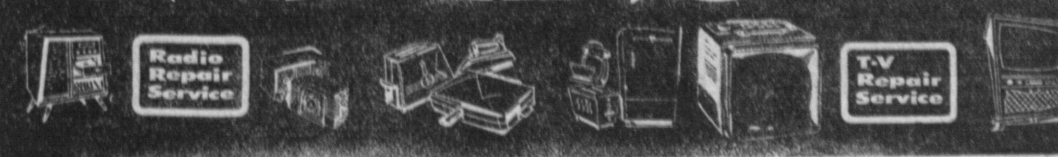
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
