

Search for Body of Man

A land and air search centered around the Torrance-Palos Verdes area for the body of a man believed slain and hidden by his son-in-law.

Object of a Southern California dragnet is Richard Pritchard, 26, a Los Angeles truck driver who disappeared several hours after he allegedly told a friend he killed James Morrow, 56, father of his estranged wife.

Sheriff's deputies and Palos Verdes police cruised the hills and canyons of the peninsula Monday and Tuesday to find Morrow's body. A helicopter joined the search yesterday.

Sees Foul Play

Det. Sgt. R. T. Hopkinson of the sheriff's homicide detail, said he definitely believes that there is strong possibility of foul play involved.

"Morrow has been missing since 9 p.m. Sunday and he hasn't been found yet," he said.

According to Hopkinson, Pritchard picked up Morrow in latter's Bell Garden home. Later he went to the home of a friend, Jeff Hampton, in South San Gabriel and told him he had killed his father-in-law and dumped the body in the Palos Verdes area.

Abandons Brother

Early Monday morning, Pritchard assertedly drove his brother, George, and Hampton to a desolate canyon in the Newhall area and ordered them out of the car. He then disappeared in a 1956 Buick.

Neither Pritchard nor Morrow have been seen since that time.

Worlds Fair Plan Revealed

A progress report, termed the "true story" of the proposed 1968 World's Fair in Southern California, will be given today at 7:45 p. m.

J. A. Smith, president of the California World's Fair, Inc. will reveal possibility of the international exhibition to be held in the Torrance area.

He will make his report to 150 Chambers of Commerce which have been invited to send representatives to the meeting to be held in the Wilmington Women's Club, Lakme Ave. and Denni St. Smith is expected to reveal detailed plans of permanent buildings, as well as a monorail system to be installed.

Plans call for large hotels, spacious auditoriums, "jet age" construction, exhibits by the nations of the world, and fabulous and novel entertainment.

In addition to Smith others who will participate in the discussion are Los Angeles Councilman Pat McGee, Spencer Monroe, executive vice president of the fair organization, L. O. Griffith, president of the Harbor District Chambers of Commerce, and others.

Monroe previously announced that a vast vacant area east of Torrance, owned by the Dominguez Estates Co. is one of six possible sites for such an international fair.
