## **Speedup in** Building of Hospital

Construction of the new 600bed Harbor General Hospital will start six months sooner than previously planned, it was disclosed by County Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

Chace said that bids for the \$14,000,000 Hospital and Outpatient Clinic will be called for next January instead of June of 1960 as a result of a speed-up of production schedules by the Architects and county hospital officials.

Plans for the badly needed facility will be submitted by the architects September 1 for approval by the state and county. The Board of Supervisors today authorized the issuance of the first block of hospital bonds to finance construction of the two and a quarter millior dollar laundry and steam and regrigeration plant which will serve the new facility.

The hospital will be located on 25 acres of propert; near the intersection of Carson St. and Vermont Ave. and will consist of eight stories with an adjoining two-story wing and outpatient clinic of reinforced concrete construction.

The building will be elevated on columns at the first floor to form a colonnade which will enable patients and visitors to enter both the public and admitting lobbies directly from their automobiles
