Investigators said they crashed through the door with a battering ram after they placed bets over the telephone with the pair. Inside the house, they said they found betting markers and other bookmaking evidence.

Ben Thwaits, who listed his occupation as a gambler on his booking slip, was identified as the son of John Henry Thwaits, who was arrested on murder charges, along with four other persons, for the slaying of Tony Mirabile, San Diego tavern owner, and reputed leader in the Ma-

Officers said young Thwaits and his wife, a housewive, did a \$5000 per day betting business.
