\$110,000 oot by Robbers

Two Torrance holdups where loot totaled \$7000, were added to the list of 27 robberies admitted by a quartet of suspects captured following a gun battle with po-

Sgt. Don S. Hamilton announced Friday that last year's \$6000 robber of the Lucky Market at Torrance and Crenshaw Blvds., and a 1953 holdup of the Safeway Store at Carson St. and Western Ave., where \$1000 was obtained, were confessed by the suspects.

In addition, tthe \$2500 robbery of the Safeway Store at 2135 Pacific Coast Highway in 1951, was admitted earlier.

The suspects, identified as Neil A. Young, 32, Robert C. Curtis, 40, Harold E. Smith, all of Long Beach, and Earle Gouethrope, 40, were captured last Friday after they assertedly exchanged gunshots with police during a market holdup in South Gate.

Hamilton said that during their nine-year career of 27 market holdups, the suspects, none believed to have a criminal record, obtained a total of \$110,000. In the robbery of the Lucky Market, they split forces, according to the story told to Torrance detectives.

Two men went inside for the actual robbery, one remained in the stolen get-away car outside, and the fourth man was behind the wheel of the second escape car parked three blocks away.
