

Big Summer Classroom Interest

Although Friday was the final day of school for some 23,000 Torrance students, nearly a third of them will return June 22 for summer school sessions.

Latest enrollment figures indicate that more than 6900 elementary and 1900 high school students have signed up for the six week sessions, which end on July 31.

Sign-ups at local schools are much heavier than usual. At Seaside School, 54 per cent of the students presently enrolled have signed up for the summer classes, while at Riviera School, 52 per cent are planning to attend.

Summer classes are considered an extension of the regular school year, with extra help offered for fast, medium, and slow learners.

High school classes will be offered for eighth graders who will become freshmen next year. More than 930 have signed up for the classes, either for credit or for extra study. Classes slated include reading, math, English, algebra, general science, Spanish, French, German, Latin, typing, instrumental music, and speech.

All schools except North High will be open for classes. NHS students will be taken by bus to South High because of construction work and sandblasting.

Starting times at the elementary schools will vary between 8 and 8:30 a.m. Exact times may be learned by calling the schools. The high schools will start at 8 a. m.

Torrance Students to Be Offered Russian Course

Two new language courses and a class in health and driver education for Torrance high school students were approved Tuesday night by the Board of Education.

The new courses are Russian I, which will be offered at South High School this fall; Exploratory Foreign Language, which will be offered in summer school only; and Health and Driver Education, which combines subjects formerly offered as parts of other courses.

The Russian course was approved, following a report on the success of an after-school Russian Club at South High last semester. Youngsters met weekly to learn the language and the program seemed to work well, school officials said. Torrance schools now offer Spanish, French, German, and Latin in high schools.

Beginning Russian will be similar in content to the other language courses. If student interest continues, more advanced Russian classes will be offered. Assistant Superintendent Albert Posner said.

The second new class, Exploratory Foreign Language, will be given in summer school only. It will give eighth grade students a chance to sample French, Spanish, German, and Latin before enrolling in beginning sections of these languages in the fall.

It is designed to help students decide what language to take and to give them a broad view of several languages and countries. The Health and Driver Education
