Not one usually given to getting on a manager's back, especially if the team is having it troubles, we nevertheless, feel Alston is expendable and may not be with the Dodgers in '60.

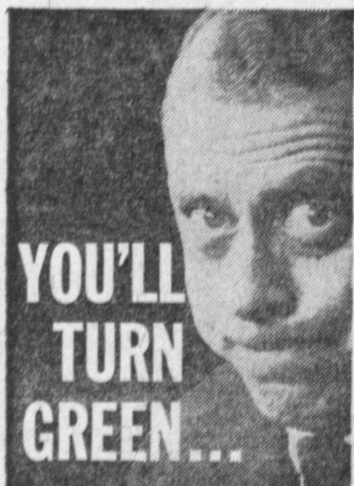
The Dodger skipper has usually played his hitters well during the current season. However, his pitchers are perhaps misused, used.

Trophies will be awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.

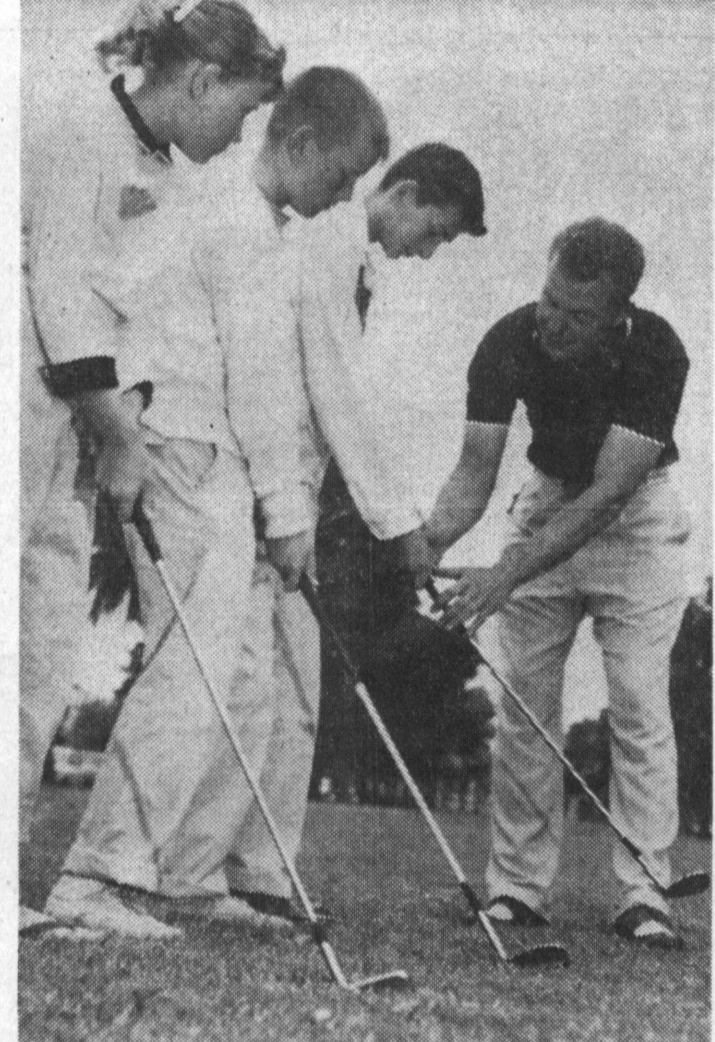

Shoup Confident of Pioneer Squad for Optimist Tilt

With a month to go until Coach Bob Shoup blows the whistle for the start of football practice, the North High coach has stated the Pioneer League seniors include the best set of graduating backs in the history of the league.

Shoup has reported his 25-man all-star football team is looking forward to its fourth annual Optimist game against the Bay League on July 18 at El Camino College.

Practice sessions will be held at Hawthorne High School commencing July 1, it was told by Shoup.

Bob was selected to coach the Pioneer League all-stars after his Saxons shared the league championship with El Segundo and Morningside and were awarded the league's playoff berth in the CIF Southern California championship play.

North lost to CIF champion Long Beach Poly, 19-13, in the final seconds of a playoff game.

When the All-Southern California (CIF AAA) football selections were considered, four backs in the Pioneer League were outstanding prospects for recognition.

The foursome—Ernie Thomson, Ken Del Conte, Carl Moore and Larry Balliett — are such outstanding graduates and college prospects that Shoup is ready to compare them as better than the South Shrine-HI backfield of the past two or three years.

"If these four youngsters are not comparable to any backs in Southern California, I have another guess coming," reports Shoup.

"In the Optimist game, the kids should prove the point that our line won't be very big, but we will have plenty of forward speed," pointed out the young coach. Bob summarizes his view of the game situation by telling of no weaknesses on his team, just a contemplated dangerous passing attack by the Bay Leaguers.

Players from Shoup's North varsity who are slated to play in the Optimist game are all-CIF back Ernie Thomson, end Dennis Berry, end Charles Bertini, tackle George Foutts, guard Dick Bybee, guard Ed Jauregui, guard Paul Shaffer, center George Morgan, quarterback Bill Hall and halfback Chuck Webb.

Carl Moore, all-Pioneer League brother of Redondo and UCLA's Dean Moore, will head El Segundo's contribution to the game. Eagles playing include end Harry Efflandt, end Jim Myers, tackle Norm Snoton, and fullback LeRoy Golding.

All-Pioneer League quarterback Larry Balliett and all-League halfback Ken Del Conte are two of five Morningside competitors, the others including end Jim Johnson, tackle Gary Loggren and guard Hugh Morgan.

Culver City has landed tackle Bob Moss, center Mike O'Sullivan and halfbacks Bruce Hichman and Al Robinson in the all-star lineup. Center John Stensvaag and guard Mike Hunter of Hawthorne complete the player roster.

Ed Levy of North High will assist Shoup as coach of the Pioneer League all-stars.

Here and There

Outdoor Life has compiled a list of the 100 best streams in the U.S.A. and California has 10. These were determined by the top fishermen of the country. The rivers are the Klamath, Eel, Russian, Trinity, Tuolumne, American, Pit, Rubicon, Feather and Truckee. The people who complain about California fishing should plan to visit these rivers for good fishing and beautiful scenery.

The largest channel catfish ever recorded on the California side of the Colorado River was a 27 pound 8 ounce taken recently by Mrs. J. C. Rhodes of Midway City. It was caught near Three Finger Lakes. Nice going lady.

California ocean waters are remaining warmer than usual again this year with inshore temperatures 4.5 degrees warmer than the average. This has brought the bait further north and the warm water fish such as yellowtail and barracuda have followed.

Hunting casualties have risen in California after 2 years of decline. In 1958 there were 120 casualties with 18 fatalities. This compares with 79 casualties and 14 fatalities in 1957. One hunter claimed he shot a man who looked like a pheasant although the man he shot was wearing a blue, red, and white plaid shirt.

The state of Wyoming reports that California hunters ranked second in license sales in the state for non residents. We bought 3532 licenses, 1907 of which were for deer.

For the next 3 to 4 weeks the size of rainbow trout dropped to 7 to 7 1/2 inches. These are the fall spawn trout and the department of Fish and Game feels that these will be up to 8 inches in a short time. Due to the dry spring the planting of trout in some of our local waters has been slowed up. Local waters in L. A. county still being planted including Crystal Lake, Big Rock Creek, San Gabriel River, East and West forks, Upper and Lower Tujunga Creek was dropped because of low water.
