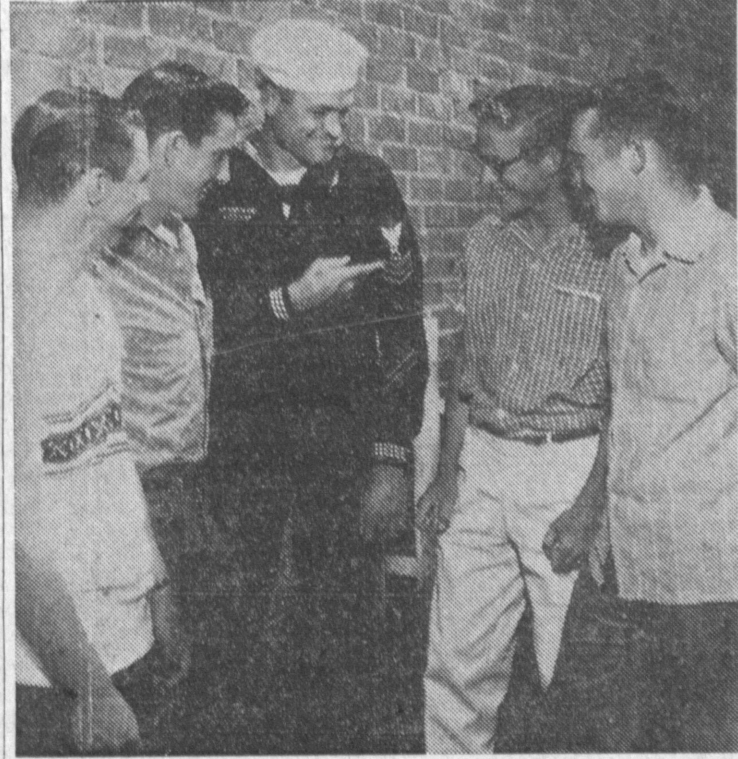
TAKEN TO HOSPITAL

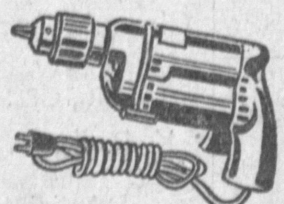
