The undersigned a resident of our supposedly "All American City" would like very much to know why you are withholding information from the residents regarding the current bus dispute? WHY ARE WE COMPELLED TO GET OUR INFORMATION FROM THE PRESS OF SURROUNDING TOWNS AND THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES?

The City Council by its action has cost the City of Torrance a great deal of prestige. The results of which they will undoubtedly feel when its members run again for public office.

The writer had occasion to discuss the matter with Councilman Nicholas Draie prior to the June 30 meeting and he stated that he was well aware of the fact that the local bus lines serving within the city limits were the ones that were losing money for the city; however, he was going to vote for the discontinuance of the Los Angeles-Torrance Line beyond 120th St.

The writer respectfully suggests and requests that your paper make a complete survey of the situation via: the number of people boarding the Los Angeles bound bus during the early morning hours enroute to their jobs as well as repeating the process during the early evening hours from Los Angeles. Then do the same thing with your local buses. You would then be able to present clear pictures to your readers of actually what is needed regarding bus transportation, and could make recommendation to better serve the community.

The residents of the community have the right to know that such matters are being passed upon by the City Council without their knowledge. It is the duty of the press to bring such matters to the attention of its readers and failure to do so not only leaves a bad taste in the mouths of those concerned with the issues at stake but also is a deterrent in the growth of circulation of your paper, since it leaves the feeling that you do not have the interest in the people as a whole.

It is suggested, at this time, that a survey be made for cross-town bus service, ie namely along Crenshaw, Normandie, Western and Hawthorne. It is desperately needed for those persons working in industries requiring less absenteeism, such as the aircraft plants. Much of the absenteeism is due to the fact that transportation to these plants from Torrance is obtained only through car pools. If a driver has a mishap enroute to work, 4 to 5 persons lose from an hour to a day's pay, because of lack of bus transportation along these avenues.
