Boy, 3, Almost Did • Not Fete Birthday

Douglas Wilson almost didn't live to celebrate his fourth birthday Thursday.

On the night before, the son of Policeman and Mrs. Philip Wilson was playing at a neighbor's home and he found a tempting bottle filled with a sweet solution.

Douglas didn't know that this was ant poison and not a new kind of soda pop.

When he returned to his own home, 5243 Doris ■ Way, he held the empty bottle of ant poison in his hand and showed it to his mother.

A speedy interrogation, and testing of the boy's tongue disclosed to the parents that Douglas must have consumed some of the poison.

They poured a salt solution into his mouth and then rushed him to Pacific Medical Clinic where Douglas' stomach was pumped. "If he hadn't carried that bottle we would never

have known about the poison," the father said. But all turned out well and Douglas was in fine shape to blow out the four candles on his birthday cake
