## **Taxes Climb** To New Highs in City, County

for Torrance residents this year. The newest spiral in what seems to be an almost inevitable carly increase was fixed this week by the County Board of Su-

It shows that in 1959-60 Torrance taxpayers will be paying a combined county-city total of about \$8.17, or 56 cents more than they paid this year. This year's rate was about

\$7.62 per \$100 assessed value. Highest item on the bill is the Torrance Unified School District max of \$3.49 per \$100 assessed valuation, a 29-cent increase over this year's figure.

"A Shocking Blow"

County supervisors this week approved the highest general tax rate in county history, a rate of \$2.08, which Supervisor Kenneth Hahn described as a "shocking blow" to county taxpayers.

The new county tax is an inease of 11 cents over this year's Tate of \$1.97.

According to Hahn, "Taxpayers will not receive the full impact of the rate increase until they get their tax bills in Novem-

For Torrance residents, those bills will include a city tax of \$1.2888, a flood control tax of \$.367, a water district tax of \$.17 and an estimated sanitation istrict tax of \$.20, for each \$100 assessed valuation.

All of these rates are higher than this year, except for a onecent drop in the water district

The El Camino College tax rate of \$.5713 brings the taxpayer's burden to a total of \$8.17. It is the first time in history that the combined county-city and rithmetic faxes have climbed over the \$8 school students.
