My husband says I am wrong, He says spanking can lead to beating and really harming our child, like the people you read about in the papers. It's true that I get very nervous sometimes and it's hard to control myself when I spank Johnny, but I would never really hurt him. I love him too much. Please tell me your opinion about spanking. Dear Worried Mother,

Spare that rod, and believe me, you will Not spoil the child! Notice I said spare. . . which means to use sparsely or very little. Spanking has a place in bringing up our children, but a very limited place. You spank only to bring a very important matter to a child's attention instantly. For instance, a three year old cannot understand the danger of running into the street. But a smart spank will make him stop, on the instant. In other words, a slap should be used to keep a child out of danger. . .not to relieve your feelings of anger and

One hint to the wise. . .a "naughty" child is usually a bored, neglected or unhappy child. Give Johnny more time and kisses and fewer slaps, Mother, and watch your nerves calm down.


Dear Miss Coe,
