A Lomita man is serving one of the most coveted assignments in the United States army—he is a member of President Dwight D. Eisenhower's White House honor guard in Washington, D.C.

PFC Larry E. Edwards, 21, son of Dorothy and Slim Edwards, 21925 S. Harvard Ave., has been with the crack capital troop since June.

He was one of seven soldiers chosen out of 50,000 to join the honor guard this summer.

PFC Edwards also will star in a television program which is being shot this week in Washington.

He plays the part of a soldier in love in a feature "Soldier in Washington," which will be released on the series, "The Big Picture."

The President's honor guard, known as the Old Guard is stationed in Arlington, Va. It stands attention at official funerals, White House functions, military fetes, and welcoming ceremonies for visiting foreign dignitaries, such as the one Tuesday for Russia's Premier Khrushchev.

Edwards has been inspected by the President several times.

The honor guard must keep at top-grade appearance and must be well-versed in parading and in the manual of arms.

According to his father, Slim Edwards, who is a guitar teacher at a Western Ave. music center, Larry calls home about once a week to let us know how he has been doing.

"This film has been taken all over Washington, on the bus and in the Pentagon," he added.

Chief of Police Warns Local Drivers of Winter Hazards

Motorists must drive defensively during the winter months ahead, cautioned Chief of Police Percy G. Bennett this week.

For safer driving during the months when children are going to and from school and fog and damp streets add to the existing hazards Chief Percy made the following suggestions.

Drive at the Posted Speed Limit and always at a speed which makes you the master of your vehicle.

Obey all traffic signs and lights.

Give the right of way to any and all pedestrians in a marked or unmarked cross walk.

Be alert for bicycle riders, allowing ample room for passing them.

Be alert when passing another vehicle keeping in mind that it

may be obscure a hazard ahead. Motorists must remain stopped as long as any school bus displays flashing red lights. This applies regardless of the direction of travel with the following two exceptions:

When the school bus is stopped at any intersection controlled by a three-phase signal or when on a divided highway headed in the

opposite direction. Drive with the same care and caution you like to see other motorists offer you.

Supervisor Hahn Makes Request for More Parks

A request to Governor Edmund G. Brown and to the State Division of Beaches and Parks to provide more and better facilities for the citizens of Southern California was made by Supervisor Kenneth Hahn today.

The Board of Supervisors adopted a motion of Supervisor Hahn's calling attention to the fact that there are over 1100 miles of coast line in California but very few picnic areas, trailer parks or camping facilities along the beaches and coast.

Supervisor Hahn stated that the State of California owns over 1600 acres on the Ventura-Los Angeles County line at the tip of Malibu which could be used for a huge trailer park and camping facility so that thousands of citizens of Los Angeles County could use this area for recreation.

He stated that as "I drive the coast highways, I see many places along the coast that could be used for recreational facilities for families of our State."
