

Purpose of the check-ups is to

detect hearing abnormalities for treatment and care. Identification of hearing difficulties is especially important for students who plan to enter professions where good hearing is essential.

The tests are administered by Los Angeles City School hearing specialists. The procedure followed is for students to listen through earphones to an audioneter, or sound producing machine, and record what they hear on charts, as sounds are increased and decreased. The charts are then checked by the audiome-

Of the Harbor students who were tested, approximately 10 percent showed appreciable hearing loss. They will consult with a city schools ear doctor, who will advise them how to conserve hearing and prevent further loss.

# It's A Wise Parent

A Common Sense Approach to Your Child

Dear Miss Coe. My boy is beginning to use terrible language, swear words and all. He has a new friend, and I'm pretty sure he's picking up these nasty words from this boy. Should I forbid them to play together, or wash out my son's mouth with soap? I know that sounds old-fashioned, but I'm pretty desperate. Also I think he enjoys shocking me. What do you think? Mrs. S. F.

Dear Mrs. S. F.

This may shock you too. . . there are no "bad" words, there are only bad thoughts!

A child who is expressing himself "nastily" is feeling nasty. He certainly enjoys shocking you, because that may be one of the few ways he has of getting your full attention.

Next time he uses a swear or "gutter" word, ask him if he knows exactly what it means. . . what is he trying to say? More likely than not, he won't know. Then "fight him with the dictionary." Show him that these words are only a tiny part of our great language, and a person who limits himself to them is limited indeed!

Next, and most important, show him that good language (including, by the way, good grammar and good enunciation) is a major part of your family standards.

Don't "exile" the new boy, or he'll become as precious to your boy as forbidden fruit. Do înclude him in your "lectures" to your son. It will give them both something to talk about!

What do I tell my children? My husband has always been a good money maker, and we have given our kids everything we could. Now he's out of work, and it looks like a long hard pull till he gets another job. Should I worry the children with our problems, or try to keep it from them?

Children, according to their age and understanding, have the right to share the family's bad times as well as the good. They will know you are worried anyway, and the secret will terrify them more than the truth. The happy child is the one who is a complete member of a complete family. Plan your future to-
