## Jahn Names **Complainant** to Safety Group

The City Council last week received its most cogent argument against its Chinese-lantern traffic signals.

Councilman Robert B. Jahn, who so named them, appointed the writer to the council's traffie safety sommittee. His letter follows. CITY COUNCIL.

CITY OF TORRANCE. As a former traffic engineer

for the City of Minneapolis, I would like to remark on the installation of some of the traffic controls now being installed in Torrance. I have recently purchased a home at 3802 West 185th Street, so feel I have a personal interest in what I think is best for the community.

The signals now being installed at 182nd St. and Prairie Ave. are definitely out of favor with both the National Safety Council and the National Traffic Safety Council. Signals suspended toward the center of an intersection, especially where the corners have "STOP" signs cause a very severe hazard. The driver will invariably stop for the sign and then proceed, if the driver is driving one of the late cars where visibility upward is difficult. This, you can be sure, is going to be a frequent cause of accidents, or, where people are crossing the street, a pedestrian hazard. The Safety Councils have recommended only the corner type of signal, and one where the driver is instructed by the performance of the signal ACROSS the street from the di-

I refer you to a book published by myself and the staff of the Minneapolis City Engineer's Department covering three years study of traffic trends and the elimination of driving hazards which might be prevented by proper signalization of intersections. This survey was underwritten by the Work's Progress Administration and directed by the National Safety Council with supervisory personnel from the Engineering Department of the City of Minneapolis. The survey included both automobile and pedestrian counts, the study of high-accident intersections, and exploratory work in placing of various types of controls to ascertain which wert the most effective in reducing hazards. 3,000 men were used in the study, and the results wert quite enlightenino

As far as costs are concerned, I know they are high. The costs in property damage and personal injury are even higher, and it seems to me that inasmuch as you are installing a certain control, it should be properly done, even though the cost is higher. Less important work might be postponed until later in order to install the proper type of control. F. E. MELLINGER
