Torrance Men Mark 40 Years With U.S. Steel

Three men—two of whom are second generation at United States Steel—were being congratulated today by fellow employees at the Torrance Works of Columbia-Geneva Steel Division after being honored for 40 years service with the company.

They are John W. Quigley, engineering and maintenance electrician, 1008 Arlington Ave., and Luis Ordaz, rolling mill tilt table operator, 2056 203rd St., both of Torrance, and Clyde Wilkinson, engineering and maintenance brick-mason, 1044 West 77th St., Los Angeles.

Each received a watch, lapel pin and service certificate in recognition of his four decades with U.S. Steel.

Quigley, recalled coyotes were commonplace in fields surrounding the plant when he joined the Torrance Works on Sept. 25, 1919, following his four years of service with the Canadian Army in World War I. A native of Halifax, N.S., he followed his father, Edward, to the Torrance works after the latter joined the firm's predecessor, Llewellyn Iron Works, in 1915. His son-in-law, Claude Gull, also works at the Torrance Works.

Also coming from a long line U.S. Steel family, Wilkinson transferred to the Torrance Works in 1947, after having been employed since Oct. 3, 1919, at the USS Homestead Works in Pennsylvania, where his father worked 47 years. A brother, Floyd, has 34 years' service at Homestead, and an older brother, William, deceased, had been with U.S. Steel 30 years when he retired.

Ordaz, who with his wife, Carmen, has lived at the 203rd St. address since 1920, remembers Western Ave. was a narrow dirt road traveled by horse-drawn vehicles, "fivers" and other early vintage motorcars when he joined the Torrance Works on Dec. 15, 1919.

In presenting the awards, W. M. Montgomery, superintendent, rolling mill, 2701 Gramercy Ave., Torrance, pointed out that 46% of the Torrance Works' employees have more than 20 years service with the company.
