Leahy Takes a Chance

He didn't prove he could handle men but I agree with Hilton and Leahy, Sid may be able to take a bunch of boys and round them into professionals. However, once they become men I doubt seriously that Sid is the man to direct them.

Dodger Doings

From the Dodger publicist, Red Patterson, we are told that the World Champions will play a total of 64 night games. A record number, surpassing the mark set in '59 by the Dodgers when they played 63 under the lights.

Red also informs us that the remaining 13 games will be day contests with 11 scheduled for Sundays. A wise move for L. A. fans proved they were not for sunlight baseball in '58 and '59.

The opening game of the 1960 schedule will also be at night. It's set for Tuesday, April 12. The Cubs, headed by the League's most valuable player, Ernie Banks, will be the Dodger opponents.

Interesting to note also is that the Dodgers will finish up their 1960 season at the Coliseum. Last year they spent them away and most of us played hockey from work to watch the thrilling stretch drive on television.

Gehrig Award to Hodges

Sometime during the season and before a home game Gil Hodges will be presented with the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award. This distinction is won by a Major League player who best typifies the spirit of the New York Yankee Hall of Famer. Since the award began a first baseman has never won. Hodges is the first.

George Trautman, head of the minor leagues and chairman of the award committee will make the presentation to Hodges. In paying tribute to Hodges, Trautman said, "Gil resembles the late Gehrig as a player, a family man and a gentleman."

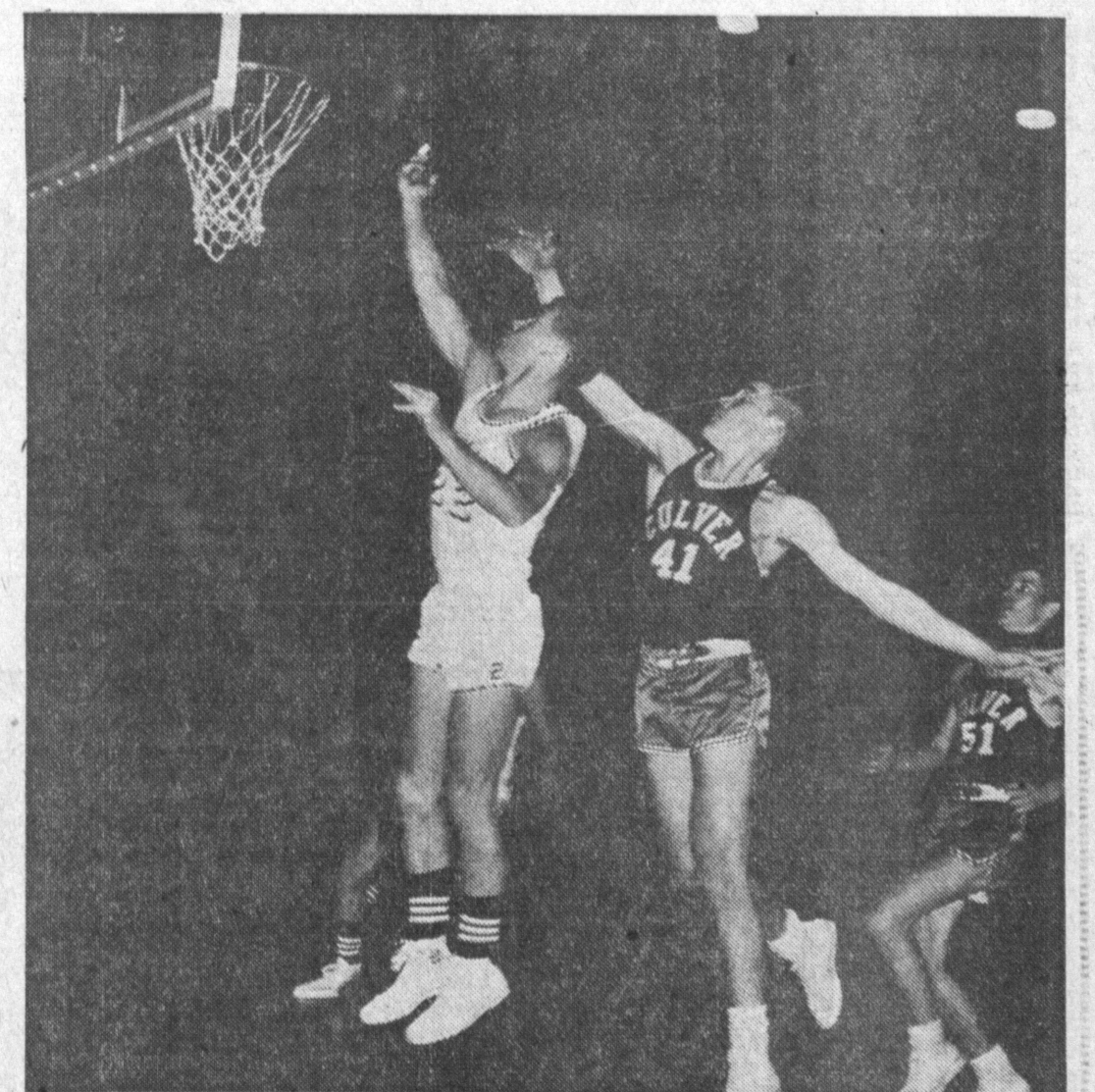
Tartars Lose to Eagles, 67-58
