Flu in epidemic proportions has struck Torrance. But, unlike the rest of the Southland, Torrance is breasting the epidemic storm in comparatively fair shape. Whereas in Los Angeles, at least five schools are reported closed due to the disabling pestilence, no closings have been as yet ordered in Torrance.

Percentages as high as 40 - or more - have stricken schools, factories, and shops in Los Angeles. The highest Torrance figure is at least 10 percent below that. Epidemic Proportions




