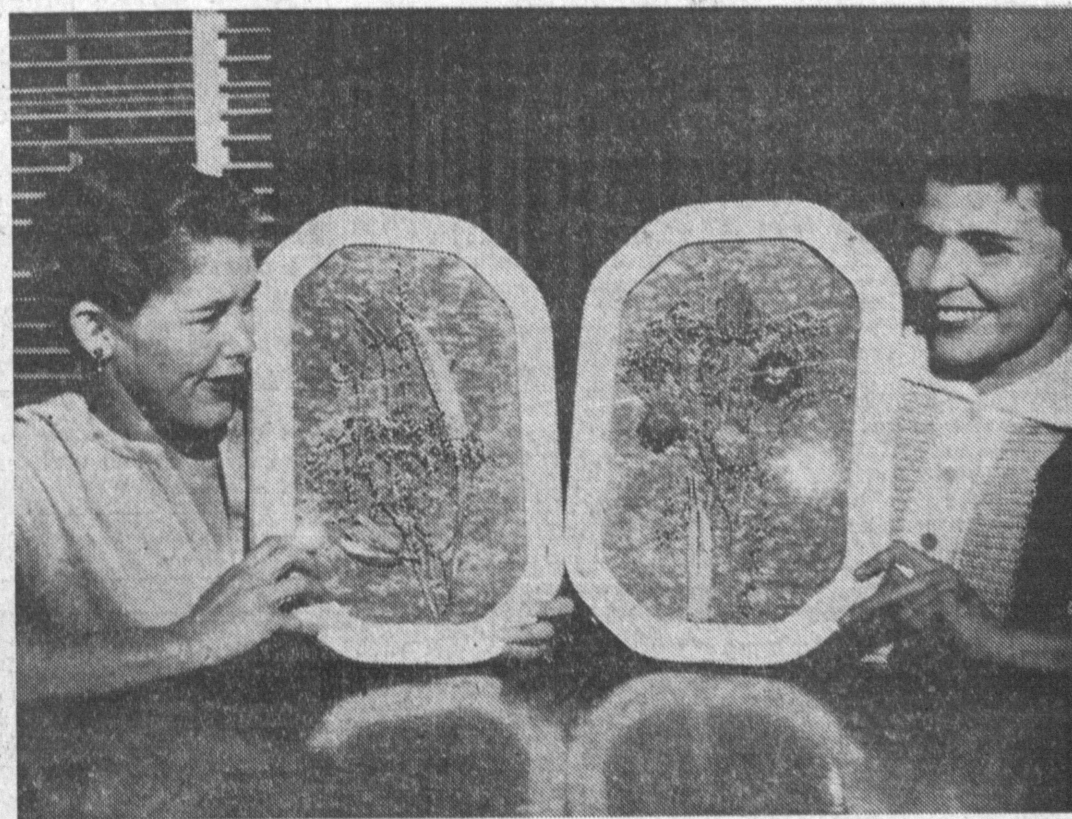
Scout Troop 2000 Learns First Aid

A Common Sense Approach to Your Child

I'm a father with a problem.

My daughter wants to major in math or science in high school. She's a bright girl but she's pretty too. That means that she'll probably get married young.

What good will math and science do her when she's a housewife and mother?

Please don't think I'm narrow minded, but my wife went to college, and she hates everything about house-keeping. It gets on her nerves and wears her out. But anything outside, like club activities she does with pleasure. I think she was educated away from the household duties that are the lot of most women, instead of toward them.

Should I let my daughter fall into the same trap?

You are more of a puzzled husband than a puzzled parent!

Don't get your daughter's interests mixed up with your wife's indifference as a homemaker.

No woman, whether college educated or not, really loves housework. Few use their schooling as an excuse for getting out of it. Yet your daughter major in math and science . . . but help her learn that the scientific method can be used in the kitchen too.
