## Nearsightedness Halted by Contact Lenses?

Fourteen hundred patients with steadily worsening cases of myopia were fitted with contact lenses, and at the end of a two-year period, none of these patients showed further increase in nearsightedness. Some even showed signs of improvement. A London physician stated that English specialists for eight years discovered a containing effect of contact lenses on progressive nearsightedness. These finds may be another factor in stimulating the already remarkable increase in adoption of contact lenses. 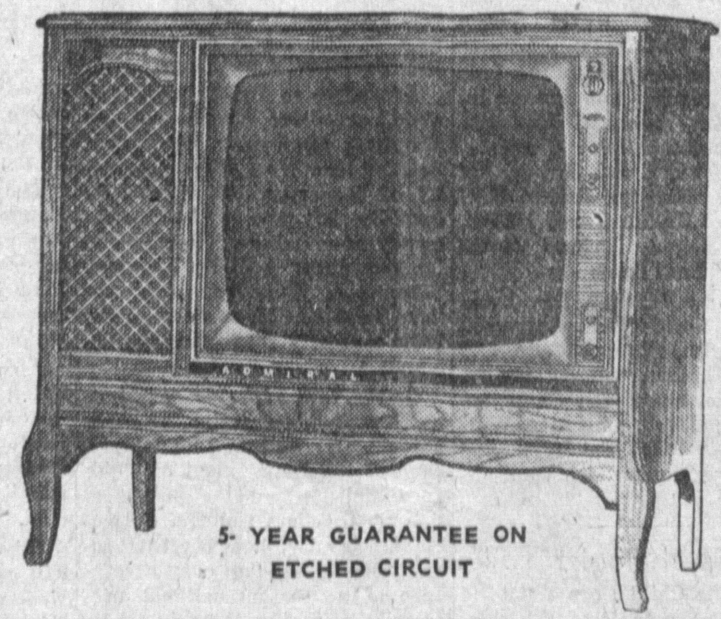
