

1960-61 School Dates Revealed for Torrance

The 1960-61 year for some 27,000 students in Torrance schools will start Sept. 14, and end June 16.

A 176-day schedule of classes was adopted. First-semester classes will end Feb. 3, 1961. Teachers will report back to class two days before school opens—Sept. 12.

School holidays are: Veteran's Day, Nov. 11; Thanksgiving, Nov. 24 and 25; Christmas, Dec. 19-Jan. 2; Lincoln's Birthday, Feb. 13; Washington's Birthday, Feb. 22; Easter, March 27-31; Memorial Day, May 30.

Summer-school sessions in 1961 will run from June 26 through Aug. 4.

Rosemary Butte Ends Ph.D. Work with Stephen Edward White Thesis

Rosemary Butte, Harbor College coordinator of public relations, has received her Ph.D. from USC.

Dr. Butte's dissertation, entitled "Stephen Edward White: His Life and Literary Career," was culmination of long interest in the man and his works.

Receiving general academic honors with a BA degree from Scripps College as an English major, she went on to UCLA for a master's degree after teaching at Santa Barbara High School.

She left the education field to be production-control expediter

at Douglas Aircraft, and by 1943 she was with KXLA as administrative secretary.

The Marine Corps Women's Reserve, hired her on the public relations staff from 1944 to 1945, at which time she received education as an English-teaching assistant at USC and later as assistant professor at San Diego State College.

Dr. Butte left teaching again from 1949 to 1951 to work as executive secretary and member of the board of Long Beach Construction Co., returned as an instructor in the Los Angeles city schools, and came to Harbor in 1954.
