### High School of Tomorrow Seen as Group of Private Offices and Individual Teaching

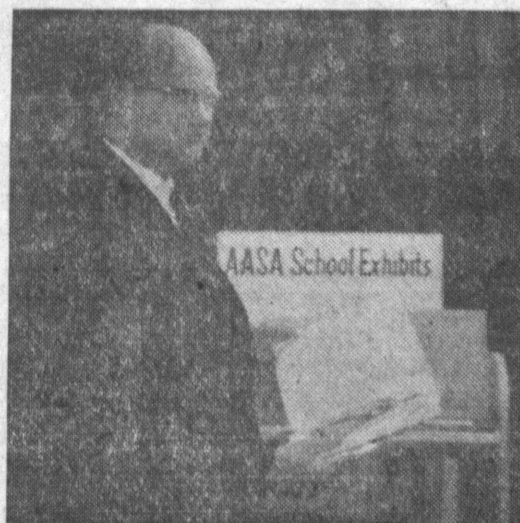
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Feb. 17—In the high school of tomorrow it may be the student will have a little niche of his own, like a private office.

This is one of the possibilities suggested by a commission of educators and architects whose proposals for future school buildings are under discussion here at the 92nd annual meeting of the American Association of School Administrators. More than 20,000 administrators and other education leaders are attending the sessions that end today.

The student's private office, it was suggested, might be a small cubicle, enclosed on three sides. Each cubicle would contain a desk and chair, a book case and storage cabinet, a filing cabinet, a bulletin board, and a television screen. Groups of these cubicles would be arranged around a central area, which would serve about 60 students, providing a meeting place for all students or smaller groups. Each group of 60 would also have a library area, and a teacher's office with sufficient space for small group meetings as well as individual conferences.

"Forward-looking practices in high schools throughout the country," commission members said in their report, "suggest that the traditional secondary-school program—with its lockstep mass scheduling, with the same-length period for all subjects, with the 16 credits for graduation, and with the uniform class size pattern—is starting to break up."

"The time will probably come soon when pupils in many high schools will have their programs developed on an individual basis. Their programs will be based on sound guidance procedures, and a basic teacher will work with the same group of pupils as an instructor, advisor,

and counselor throughout their high school career.

"Specialists in various subject fields will serve a very important function as directors of learning in their particular laboratories, but pupils will come to them with clear purposes. Teachers will then cease being disciplinarians so much of the time and will become directors of learning."

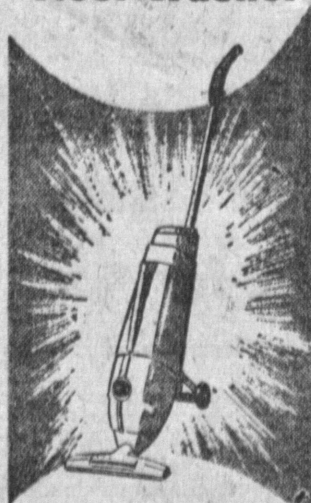

### Bank of America Honor Students

The search to find the high school senior students who will be honored in this year's state-wide Bank of America Achievement Awards program has nearly ended.

Faculty committees from high schools throughout the state, including this area, will report their candidates for the various awards within a few days.

Announcement of local winners will be made about March 15. For "outstanding scholarship, leadership and promise of future service to society," about 2400 Southern California students will receive certificates of achievement; 800 will get gold trophies, and 252 who

survive group oral interviews in competition with other schools will receive cash awards.

In Southern California there will be 12 awards of \$1000 each, and others ranging down to a large group of \$25 awards.

Zone competitions with other schools will be held in April, and all first place winners in the zone events will go to the finals in May, where they will receive cash awards ranging from \$100 to \$1000 each.

Cash awards for Southern California will total \$32,100, and for the entire state \$64,200.
