"The Bible is the most popular book among blind people," said Ted R. Carmack of the publicrelations department of Braille Institute in a talk and film presentation before the Men's Club of the Riviera Methodist Church

He said that whereas the average inked edition of a Bible can be bought for \$5 to \$10, a Bible in Braille has a cost of \$90 a

It runs 20 volumes, weighs 72 pounds, and requires five feet of shelf to hold each copy.

He detailed the way blind emotional disturbed children are aided by a reasearch project sponsored by the institute and gave a rundown on recreational, educational, and job - placement programs available to Southern California's blind.


