YW Wives Hear Talk on Plastic Surgery

"Plastic surgery should not be viewed as a mysterious, exotic form of medicine," Dr. Simon Schroeder, Los Angeles plastic surgeon, told the Torrance YWCA Wives at their last meeting.

The doctor, who is head of the Plastic Surgery Foundation, employed slides of case histories to illustrate his lecture on personality changes after plastic surgery. A question period followed the remarks of the speaker, who was introduced by Marguerite Lofland, president of the group.

"Most people," Dr. Schroeder said, "go to a plastic surgeon not because they are vain but because they do not want to be different."

Plastic surgery, he said is now within the reach of all. The surgeon, who was a founder of Children's Plastic Surgery Foundation, deplored the fact that many parents permit children to grow up with easily remedied facial defects. "This often leaves permanent psychological scars," he said.

These defects, such as elephant ears, lack of a chin, grotesque nose, are generally less costly and easier to correct than buck teeth, he declared.
