Women Eligible for Industrialist, Scientist Awards, DuBridge Says

"California women are as eligible for the Scientist and Industrialist Awards of the Year as their male counterparts," Dr. Lee A. DuBridge said today.

Dr. DuBridge, chairman of the awards program, sponsored by the California Museum Foundation, said that nominations are open to all Californians who have contributed to the advancement of scientific knowledge or industrial progress.

Those nominated for the industrialist award also are judged for their efforts in improving the welfare of their employees, the quality of the products or processes and the general condition of the community in which they operate.

Many woman Californians can fill the requirements for either the scientist or industrialist of the year. Two juries will analyze the nomination forms, available at the California Museum of Science and Industry, 700 State Dr., Exposition Park, Los Angeles 37.
