To promote the welfare of youth, and clarify relationships between home and the school, educators and the public, are the objects of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers of which the Torrance Council PTA is a part.

Hamilton and Jefferson are among new units formed during the past year swelling current membership to 17,262.

Members provide milk and lunches for children in need of better nutrition. They donate funds to the Torrance Dental Health Association to provide dental care for children unable to secure care at the time of need.

Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets are supplied to those in need during the holiday season. Some units such as Yukon went outside the local community and supplied food, clothing, and toys to the Navajo and Apache Indians.

Carr PTA supplied toys to the Marine Toy Drive; Steele provided gifts to the Mormon School in San Pedro. Torrance Elementary provided trees for the TB ward at General Hospital.

During the year Torrance PTAs joined District 33 in supplying birthday cakes for children at Juvenile Hall.

Many members assist school nurses and doctors in physical examinations, dental checks, and immunizations. Madonna held First Aid classes. The Sepulveda unit provided police clinics.

Many units have bicycle clubs to teach children bicycle skills and safety. Perry PTA is sponsoring a safety poster contest; Edison PTA was instrumental in securing a black top walkway for children's protection. Parkway has worked for many months to secure a traffic signal at Calle Miramar and Palos Verdes Blvd.

International relationships were emphasized with several units corresponding with citizens of Kenya, in cooperation with the Torrance city-to-city program.

Seaside PTA sent magazines to Kona College. Torrance associations support the American Field Service and its program of exchange students. Many units including Flavian and Newton feature these students at meetings.

Walteria found its members represented many countries and are using association meeting programs to learn more about the races represented in its community.

North High, South High, and Torrance High sponsored after-graduation parties and hosted the district's College Advancement Night program.

Acting as liaison between parent and school is the responsibility of the PTA. Serving coffee to Kindergarten mothers, as did Fern-Greenwood; and sending a representative to the Torrance Educational Advisory Committee meetings and Board of Education meetings is only a small part.
