Gardena Senior Wins Jaycee 'True Security' Contest Here

The Gardena Junior Chamber of Commerce set its sights on state and national victory after its high-school entry won the district contest here in the "My True Security" program this week.

At the Jaycees' District 12 competition, Charles Moffitt, Serra High School senior, won over Barbara Hunting of Torrance, Gary Winslow of Inglewood, and Charles Purzycki of the Crenshaw district.

Contestants are judged on content and delivery of their talks on what real security is.

The state competition will be held in Inglewood next Saturday. A \$200 scholarship will go to the state winner along with an

expense-paid trip to Washington for the national competition in July. National awards are a \$2000 scholarship to the winner with a \$1000 and a \$750 scholarship for the next two winners.

Judges for the District 12 competition were Councilman J. A. Beasley of Torrance and Earl F. Holbrook, editor of The Press. District 12 extends from El Segundo to San Pedro and includes 13 clubs.

Sponsors of this second annual essay-and-speech contest were the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Co.

The theme stressed initiative and self-reliance as security.

Ryan Gets \$1,100,000 Order for Radar Units from Sikorsky

Ryan Electronics, division of the Ryan Aeronautical Co., has been awarded three new contracts totaling more than \$1,100,000 by Sikorsky Aircraft, division of United Aircraft Corporation.

The orders called for an additional quantity of radar navigation sets, spares, and test equipment for Sikorsky's navy helicopters.

The Ryan continuous-wave ground-velocity systems help give the navy all-weather capability in antisubmarine war.

Based on Ryan's advanced work in continuous-wave radar,

the system is a major item among several devices which enable a helicopter, for the first time, automatically to achieve and maintain a hovering position over land or sea on instrument flight.

The AN-APN-97 automatically measures the heading, drift, and vertical components of aircraft movement. It functions without a ground station, wind estimator, or air-speed data.

The new contracts will extend production of the sets into 1961, and boost total sales of the units for Sikorsky to \$6,400,000.

Torrance Engineer on Team Making Study of Stricken City in Morocco

A professor from the University of California at Berkeley and a steel engineer from Torrance are members of a United States team of specialists scheduled to fly to Agadir, Morocco, Thursday for a special study of the stricken city.

Ray Clough, professor at the University of California who is well known in the field of earthquake engineering, and R. W. Binder, chief engineer at the Pacific coast division of Bethlehem Steel Co. here and a director of the Earthquake Engineering Research Institute are members of the mission being sponsored by the American Iron and Steel Institute.

Also on the team are W. G. Kirkland chief of the engineering division of the American Iron and Steel Institute, who is heading the mission, and T. R. Higgins, director of engineering and research for the American Institute of Steel Construction.

Agadir suffered one of the major civilian disasters in history early this month when earthquake and tidal wave destroyed the city and left more than 10,000 dead and 20,000 injured.

The mission will make a detailed inspection of the city. Results will be turned over to the Moroccan government for guidance in building codes to prevent repetition of the disaster.

Three Torrance High Teachers Win Scholarships to Summer School

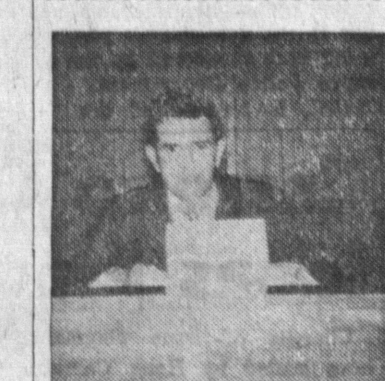
Summer-school scholarships offered by the National Science Foundation were awarded to three Torrance High School teachers this week.

Robert McKnight, science-department chairman and chemistry teacher at Torrance High, will study radiation in biology at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque.

Alfred H. Smith will attend the summer institute for high-school teachers of biology at USC from June 20 to July 30.

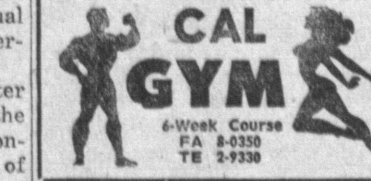
