Keberlein Asks Councilman Districts, Attacks Spending

Working toward securing councilman districts for true citizen representation and maintaining a firm and uncompromising attitude against unwise and wasteful spending, including legislative blunders, are major planks in Walter Keberlein's platform to become a member of Torrance City Council.

He said his experience in operating a number of successful small businesses, where the wise and resourceful spending of limited funds is a necessity, is more important than any so-called experience as a public servant.

A city operating along the resourceful lines of a small-business man will be of more benefit to the citizens individually than any other accomplishment, he declared.

A city the size of Torrance should have councilman districts so the average citizen will, when the need arises, be able to consult with his representative.

Under our present system, it is possible for one councilman to pass the buck to another, reasoning that the complainant is just one voter, and what is his vote in a city of this size? Keberlein asked.

He worked hard outside to attend high school and college, and this experience left him a deep respect for the value of a dollar, he said. This respect, he declared, must be applied in all levels of government, including the Torrance City Council.

A family man he has been interested in education and welfare of youth, Keberlein said. In this connection, he noted, everyone should support any program for better education.

He and his wife, Ruth, sons Roland and Michael, live in North Torrance, where the boys attend Casimir School.
