Torrance has voted one of its ablest legislators out of office. Robert B. Jahn was probably the most conversant with the times and the issues and the most articulate member of the City Council.

Traditionally the more competent rarely are elected to office at any level of government. This is largely because the privilege of voting also carries the privilege of not being required to know what the vote is about.

"May the best man win" is a fine concept, but not applicable to politics. The most competent generally are alive to the detraction that accompanies an elected job and abstain from exposing themselves to vilifivation. The better man rarely wins; the best man never runs.

Bob Jahn was a better man. His colleagues listened to him, and, although they may have disagreed, they were sensible to the contentions he urged for or against an issue.

This is to take nothing away from the incumbents: Torrance has had and still has a good council.

Although it is lamentable that ability is cast aside. 3 this condition is not peculiar to politics. At no level of society is there a market for an individual's best work. An architect of the Wright school may be reduced to designing tract houses-square boxes with rectangular holes to see out. A writer cannot sell his best, so he writes junk; the able musician composes pop tunes; the fine artist paints commercial trash in order to eat.

Bob Jahn gave his best on the City Council. In his determination to serve the city and the public, he could not please everyone. In the light vote cast Tuesday apparently were members of groups he displeased. He had no patience with, nor mercy on, pressure groups.

Bob Jahn's term on the City Council aged him and cost him a lot of money. From a selfish standpoint, he should be glad he's out of it.
