first, the councilmen were told. "The freeway program is the biggest thing of its kind ever attempted," said Telford," and much time and effort has gone into the conclusions. It takes time to agree. We have a seven-year backlog of routes adopted-this is required for freedom in planning."

He said the highway department is spending \$60,000,000 a year on rights-of-way for freeways.

"When we have finished your links, we want you to have some place to go," he said, pointing again to the folly of building little sections of the program here and there.

On the subject of Los Angeles' terror, the downtown interchange, the group was told the routes are being spread out by the Golden State and Santa Monica freeways rather than doubledecking the Santa Ana, Harbor, Hollywood, and Pasadena routes. In a 24-hour period, 200,000

cars go over the Hollywood-Harbor lanes. Uncertainty of the federal highway program was blamed for much stalling in the work in California. For a time, Bradford said, it appeared the en-

tire project would be badly curtailed. Then the money was restored. Now, he said California is

short \$70,000,000 from the United States this year, and expects to be \$50,000,000 light next year.

Womack said he was delighted to meet a group interested in getting freeways. Usually, he said, the state has to fight to get them through.


