### Children Fight Indians, Follow Pioneers, Find What's Shaking On The Oregon Trail

Members of Thelma Schoepe's fourth-grade class at Yukon School are learning about America's westward movement by re-enacting part of it.

The youngsters are taking an imaginary journey across the country, following the old wagon routes from Independence, Mo., along the Oregon Trail. They hope eventually to branch off the Oregon Trail to arrive in Torrance. Currently they are crossing Nebraska, heading for Laramie, Wyo.

As they progress in their journey, the students are studying the country along the way, its history, geography, plant life, animals, and other factors important to the Oregon Trail. In this way, they hope to cover a number of fields—social studies, science, math, and art.

They have built small covered wagons and the auxiliary equipment to go with these old modes of transportation. Occasionally, to add realism, the students form a real wagon train and learn about the customs of the old pioneers.

The youngsters have organized into family groups for each of six covered wagons, and these groups work on special phases of the study together. Bruce Wing was chosen wagonmaster by the group, to direct the student activities under the eye of Mrs. Schoepe. Lyn Marcus is scout keeping an eye peeled for Redskins.

"I find this is one way to get children interested in learning as much as possible about American history," said the teacher. "They really want to be authentic."
