The convention theme "May Our Past Accomplishments be but a Prologue to the Future" will salute the 22 charter clubs which pioneered the federation sixty years ago.

On Monday evening delegates will hear reports by executive officers and a musical program, followed by the president's reception, honoring Mrs. A. F. Benton, president. Hostesses for the reception will be presidents of the six Los Angeles area districts.

General session on Tuesday will include revisions, resolutions, and presentation of candidates. A motion-picture and television award luncheon will follow in the ballroom.

In the afternoon, Dr. Katherine Lackey will speak on "Community Development, A Social Movement of the Second Half of the Twentieth Century."

Mrs. Benton, and Mrs. Donald Amato, junior director, will give reports at the evening session followed by presentation of special awards for CARE, and community achievement and conservation.

Wednesday activities will start with a parliamentary workshop at 7:45 a.m. District presidents and state chairmen reports and a musical program are scheduled for the morning.
