Recognition Night, Career Day Planned as Hospital Week Events

The patient's recovery in the hospital of today is aided by many hands and many skills that never emerge from behind the scenes, A. L. Thomas, administrator of Harbor General Hospital said today on the opening of National Hospital Week.

"While the patient is well aware of the care of nurses, doctors, and technicians who come to his bedside, there are many others never seen by him who

also contribute to his recovery," Thomas continued.

"For each hospital patient, food is cooked to meet his special needs; complete records of his care and progress are kept up to date; linens are processed to high hospital standards; laboratory tests are run and x-ray films developed by skilled workers; supplies are kept in readiness, and equipment maintained in constant order. All of these

tasks are performed by people the patient rarely sees."

Harbor Hospital is joining with others throughout the country in observing National Hospital Week. This year's theme—"The Hospital—Many Hands and Many Skills," emphasizes the role of hospital personnel.

Included in the week's activities will be a recognition night Tuesday for the Hospital Volunteers, to present service awards,

including pins to be awarded to 30 members who have contributed more than 500 hours.

Also scheduled is a Career Day Thursday, in which 22 members of the Teen-age Volunteers will serve as division heads for a portion of the day, to emphasize the various skills required in the operation of a large general hospital.

"I've found a sponsor," rang the happy voice of a prospective AWTAR contestant. Just what does this word "sponsor" mean and what does a "sponsor" do to contribute to the success of the All-Woman Transcontinental Air Race?

A sponsor is an individual, a company, a chamber of commerce, a town, a city council, a group of merchants, an airport, an aircraft sales company—any one person or group of persons interested in the promotion of aviation to the extent that he or they will help finance a woman pilot's participation in the AWTAR.

Sponsors recognize the promotional value of the race and realize that the wide publicity it accrues is bound to stimulate increased aviation activity in Torrance as well as throughout the country.

They know the race encourages flight instruction, emphasizes utility of private aircraft, brings public attention to our own airport. They believe in the air age and believe women are as much a part of this age as they are of the automotive age these past 40 years. They are proud to have their name, their city, their chamber of commerce, their company or corporation, painted on the side of the aircraft they are sponsoring and know that, as that sign is read from coast to coast, others will know of and appreciate their interest in the promotion of private flying.

Many of our thoroughly qualified woman pilots would be financially unable to compete in the AWTAR were it not for the help they receive from their sponsors.

Some require complete backing while others need partial support. The amount of assistance needed by a contestant varies according to each individual's situation.

Each year the problem of getting a sponsor has become a bit easier for the contestants, and directors of AWTAR appreciate all those who have sponsored contestants this year and in the past years, thereby showing the way to others, and have thus helped us to build this race into the great annual classic it has now become.

Democrats, Republicans Join, Defeat Bonelli Senate Plan

In a nonpartisan move almost unique in California politics, state Democratic and Republican party leaders joined hands today to fight the so-called Bonelli plan for reapportionment of the state Senate, which has found a place on the November ballots as Proposition 15.

As chairmen on the Advisory Council of the statewide Committee to Keep California United, which is carrying the fight to defeat the reapportionment proposal, William A. Munnell of Los Angeles, chairman of the State Democratic Central Committee, joined with George W. Milias of Gilroy, chairman of the state Republican Central Committee, to lambaste the reapportionment measure.

Munnell said: "The plan for reapportionment of the state Senate is a threat to the rights of every California voter, regardless of political belief or party affiliation. This measure must be defeated if there is to be fair and representative government in the state."

"California continues to grow at a fantastic rate each year. To meet this phenomenal growth, all California must have water. Any change for realignment of senatorial representation at the present time is unwise, and may jeopardize the entire water program."

"The present plan for reapportionment is both rash and untimely. I feel that every California voter must be alerted to the dangers inherent in this measure, and that all must be urged to join together to defeat Proposition 15."

Milias said: "The so-called Bonelli plan is a threat to the rights of every California voter. The measure must be defeated if there is to be any pretense of representative government in California."

"If reapportionment is needed, this power-grab by a small group of local interests is not the way to bring it about. The Bonelli scheme, if it should become law, would completely destroy the checks and balances of our modified federal system of government which has protected the interest of both urban and rural areas for many years."

"Proposition 15 will ask Cal-

ifornia voters to give up all protective representation for the vast areas of the state which are the reservoir of California's natural economy. Our agricultural, water, mining and forest areas would be subject to the whims and vagaries of a state Legislature completely controlled by an area of dense population where local interests are often at wide variance with those of the state as a whole."

U. S. Education Official Visits Schools Here

Dr. Charles Fitzwater, chief of the Local School Administration section of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, last week visited the Torrance Unified School District, to get information on operation of a fast-growing district.

He said Torrance was chosen as a West Coast example for study his department is making. They are planning to publish a booklet explaining best administrative practices in fast-growing districts, he said.

Dr. Fitzwater previously studied districts in New Mexico, Utah, Colorado, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, and Minnesota. He said Torrance is known to educators throughout the country because of its work in solving growth problems, the "Little Red School" or multigrade program, its "Supermarket of Knowledge," or educational-material building, and its handling of school financing.

Council OKs Tract Change

Torrance City Council approved McDonald Tract situated at Arlington approximately 300 feet northerly of 182nd St., for single family residential development. The tract will be developed into 33 lots, according to map presented to the council by Property Management Co., 15502 Crenshaw Blvd.
