## Glendale Savings **Aide Testifies** in Washington

In testimony presented be fore the Senate subcommittee on housing last week, Charles A. Wellman, executive vice president, Glendale Federal Savings and Loan Associa-tion, commented about the pending legislation which would authorize the Federal National Mortgage Association to buy \$1,000,000,000 in FHA and GI home loans at par under a special assist-ance program.

"Certain provisions of the bill, which has passed the House, said Wellman, would violate the basic businesslike principles upon which FNMA originally was established, causing undue expense to the treasury.

Wellman's objection centered around certain provi sions of the bill which did not clearly indicate how the buyer would receive benefits of low - cost housing.


